

ith the kids happily settled in for a sleepover at their grandparents' place, my husband and I set off on a three-hour drive from our home at the foot of the Blue Mountains towards our destination, Basalt in Orange, NSW. We visited the town years ago, but I was on bridesmaid duties then, and we didn't see much beyond the wedding venue. This time, I want to explore.

It's mid-afternoon when we drive through the front gates and pull up alongside 'Yonder', the studio we'll be staying in for the next two nights. It's a handsome building – all dark lines, earthy hues and warm wood – but the setting in a peaceful ridge is something else altogether. "The views are incredible and were really going to waste, enjoyed only by the kangaroos, prior to building Basalt," co-owner Simon Rollin explains to me later.

I stand on the deck and take in the sights – a grassy slope gives way to a sea of cherry trees and, beyond that, the Central Tablelands, undulating towards the horizon. It's easy to see why the luxury accommodation has been added to the property, which Simon's parents, Sue and Graham, have grown fruit on since 1979. "It gives them a chance to showcase this land, which they've spent the majority of their lives nurturing and caring for."

You won't spot another soul during your stay; well, we didn't. There are just three villas on the vast estate and they're set a generous distance apart. Each appears to be an

extension of the land, by design. "The orcharding practice of grafting inspired our architect," says Simon. "He envisioned them 'grafted' into the hillside, kind of bunkered into it rather than protruding from it."

As I slide open the timber-framed glass front door, I appreciate its weight before stepping inside. Here, we can really enjoy the combined efforts of Cameron Anderson Architects and Lisa Johnson Design Studio. The interiors feel like an embrace, with a timber-wrapped ceiling, polished concrete floors and rammed-earth walls. An inviting king-sized bed with Carlotta+Gee linen bedding holds court in the centre of the space, with a Joe loveseat and round ottoman from MCM House alongside it.

Tucked behind a pony wall is a compact kitchen, complete with pint-sized dishwasher. We're delighted to find a bevy of complimentary treats, from a block of boujee dark chocolate to marshmallows for roasting. "We do get a lot of comments about all the extra inclusions and the level of detail in everything," says Simon.

While the deep tub looks tempting, we wander out to the fire pit, where the wood is already chopped. We get it roaring just as the sun is setting and the chill is creeping in, and enjoy the heat with a glass of wine. As our tummies start rumbling, we're grateful to have opted for the Thai red beef
